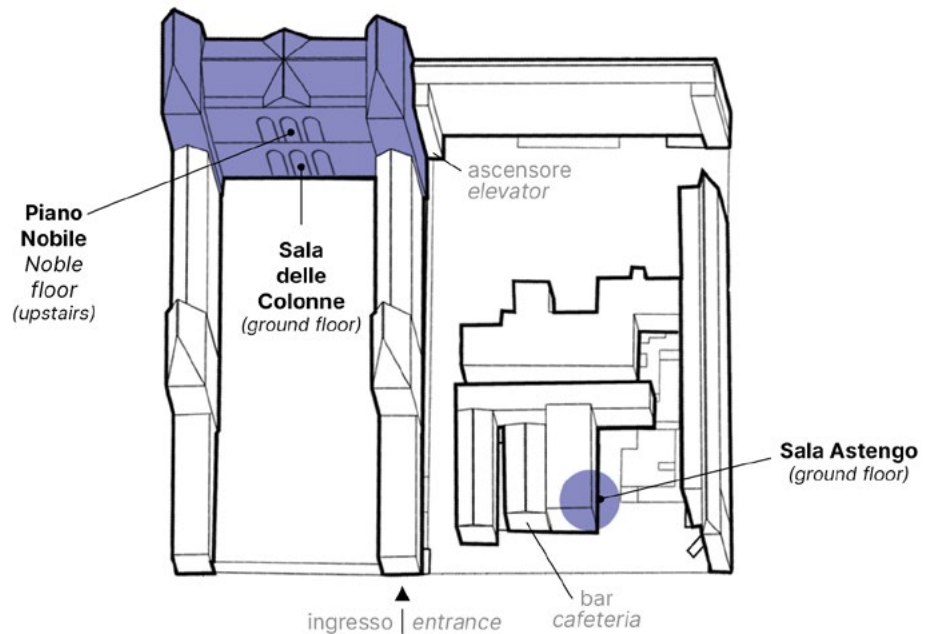
Torino, Italy, 21-23 February 2024

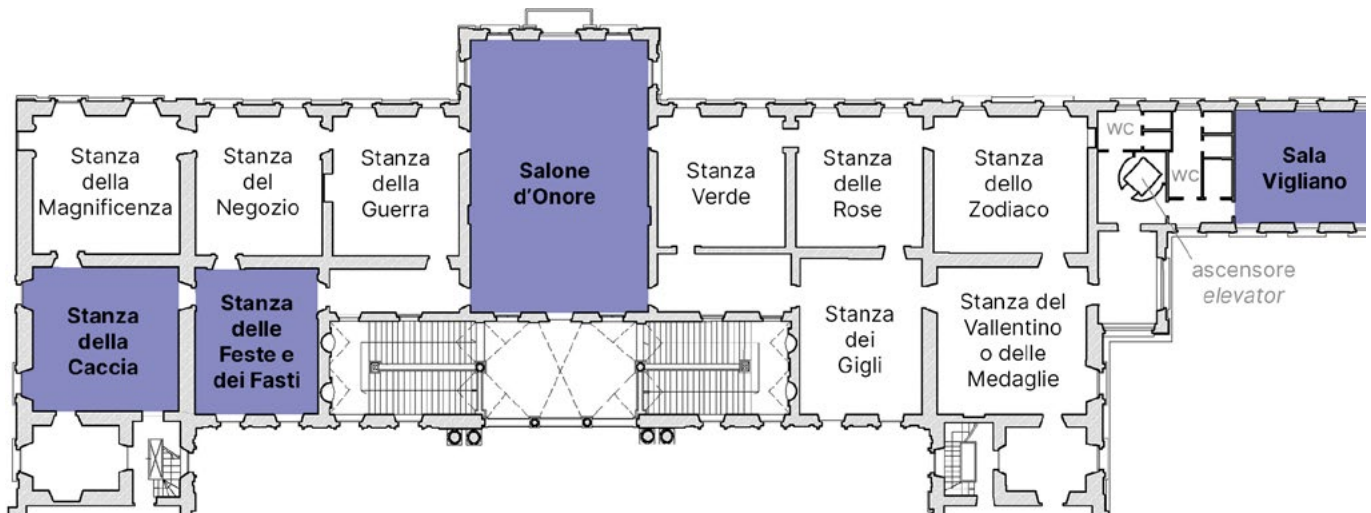

What is urban violence? While it pops up all the time in the media, in the political discourse, in the academic debate, and in the street, the term urban violence still remains profoundly under-theorised, yet to be fully unpacked with respect to a geographic understanding of the ‘urban’ and ‘urbanisation’ that cannot be reduced to the physical boundaries of the ‘city’. Urbanisation, and the violence thereof, affects the rural, the remote, the wilderness, all of them, in fact, terms that relies on the urban itself for their own definition. What is the ‘urban’ in urban violence then, and what kind of violence are we talking about when we talk about urban violence? What is the imaginary that informs urban violence, what are the processes that feed it, what are the spatio-legal dynamics that shape it, what the urban atmospheres through which it is experienced, reproduced, and endured? These are some of the questions this roundtable will discuss, taking the cue from the recently published Urban Violence.
