(ifa Gallery, SAVVY Contemporary, Berlin, 2021) and "Housing Pharmacology" (Manifesta 13, Marseille, 2020). She received her PhD in Architectural History and Theory (with distinction, ETH medal) from ETH Zurich and has taught at Princeton University, ETH Zurich, University of Zurich, University of Art and Design Geneva, and Cornell University. In 2024, she joined the faculty of the Peter Guo-hua Fu School of Architecture at McGill University, where she also serves as Director of Graduate Programs.
